Two running for 2nd District School Board seat

Two candidates have qualified to run in the second district school board race that will be on the November 8th ballot, according to the circuit clerk's office.

Whitney Kilgore and Jessica Seaton Parrish have both qualified for the regular election to replace Dr. Debra Brewer, who is retiring.

Also on the ballot will be the first district supervisor race. So far, only Joey Price and incumbent Eric Booker have qualified.

Qualifying deadline is Friday, September 9th.

County approves new millage, tax rate

The county board of supervisors voted to approve a slight increase in millage following the public hearing Tuesday. The complete budget and approved millage rates are detailed on page ____.

The small increase will mean, for example, an extra \$15 in taxes annually for a \$100,000 home.

NG starting work at Building 1000

Though nothing official has been announced, Northrop Grumman provided the board with drawings and specs explaining their work to convert part of Building 1000 at Tri-State Commerce Park, in line with months of rumors of hundreds of new jobs coming to the Iuka location of the national aerospace company. Sources say demolition work has begun this week.

The county is working with Northrop Grumman and Northeast Mississippi Community College, who both are tenants in Building 1000, to make sure each has what they need for planned expansions.

Ford announces public safety training

Dr. Ricky Ford, president of Northeast, was at the Tuesday meeting to share with the board Northeast's plans to phase the Tri-State class facilities to a regional public safety training center.

The remoteness of Tri-State Commerce Park will be favorable to this plan, which could evolve into a full-scale

Painted Lady is Back!

The grand dame at Mineral Springs starts new life as event venue, bed and breakfast

The Victorian beauty at the corner of historic Mineral Springs Park in Iuka starts a new career soon as Iuka's premier event venue.

A private investor has closed on the property, the city of Iuka amended it's zoning ordinance, and a local management team is touching up landscaping and interiors in preparation of renting the showcase antebellum home beginning in the next month or so, according to Sara Cooley, one of several people managing the property.

When it opens, the Painted Lady will be the first wedding and event venue in town, aside from local churches, accessing the potentially lucrative wedding and event market. For example, the average amount spent on weddings in the U.S. is \$20,000, and businesses around a good venue, from florists and photographers to convenience stores, benefit from having a business like this in town.

"We are excited for this opportunity, and are thankful for all the people who have helped make it happen," said team member Tara Wadkins. "This is going to be great for the community, and an asset to the city. We are looking forward to all the stories this place will be a part of in this new phase."

For years the now five-bedroom home sat empty, or divided into apartments, and even one time an antique store. After renovating her childhood home across Pike Street, Kathy Daugherty Gurley and her late husband Bill set their sights on restoring the home to it's former glory beginning in about 2012. Bill and Kathy used top craftsmen and builders in the area to completely gut and then rebuild the home, giving maximum attention to architectural details and furnishing it with carefully curated, genuine European antiques.

The Gurleys hosted parties and gatherings for several years, providing the perfect backdrop for Battle of Iuka sesquicentennial events of 2013-2014, but it was also their home, comfortably furnished and guests were always welcomed warmly. They put the house on the market several years ago, when they moved closer to family, but it was surely destined to become an event venue, and will hopefully enjoy more glory days in the coming years under the new owners and management.

The home sold for around \$760,000, down from the \$1 million it was listed for originally.

law enforcement training academy. Classroom training can begin immediately, explained Dr. Ford, and expansion can happen as needed. Such entities prefer a remote location, and the facility might even be renovated to include some dormitory features, for multi-day training like the ones provided at Meridian, which is the closest.

Also at the meeting, county emergency manager Peyton Berkite announced that the entire county emergency system won a grant that allows the county to buy \$630,000 of first-

responder radios for about \$30,100 of matching funds. 176 portable radios, eight mobiles and the programming for 190 units are included in the grant, she explained.

Fifth District Supervisor Greg Collier stressed the need to make each potential user sign for the radios and be held accountable for the units, each of which are worth several hundred dollars.

The board approved fixing leaks in the roof of the Tishomingo Volunteer Fire Department building, with the Town of Tishomingo splitting the cost.

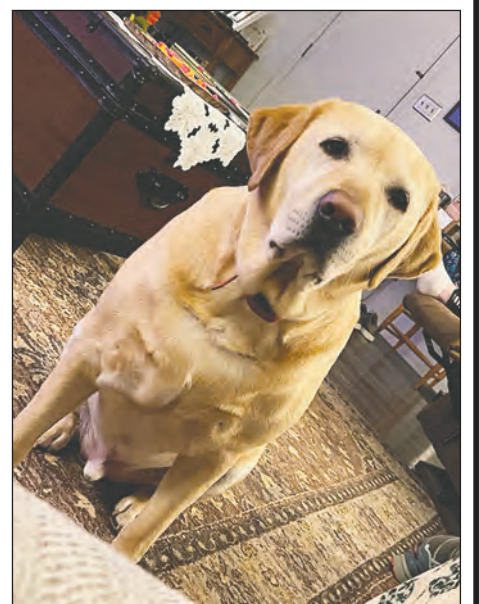

Cheese miracle remains childhood highlight

One in four children in Mississippi will go to bed hungry tonight. Over half the population of senior citizens in our state experience monthly food shortfalls. Mississippi is statistically proven to be the hungriest state. Right here at home in Tishomingo County 1 in 6 people don't have enough access to healthy fresh food options. Do you know how hungry feels? Have you ever had less than twenty dollars left in a week to feed a family of four? Have you gone to bed hungry because supper only goes so far split six ways. If you haven't, you're lucky. I can guarantee that someone you know, maybe even someone you love, knows the ache all too well.

Like most Mississippians, I grew up poorer than I even knew. I had plenty of people who loved me to make sure I was never hungry. We just didn't have the finances to afford extravagant

grocery items. I'm not sure how old I was the day I witnessed a miracle in the kitchen of our tiny singlewide mobile home. I had gotten sick at school prompting the office to call my mother to pick me up. On the way home, we stopped by the Fred's store to pick up a few things we needed. Looking back, it must have been one of those weeks that didn't stretch to the next payday. My brother and I were not the type of kids to pressure our parents when it came to money or material things. We just didn't ask for much. On the day of the miracle, I felt so awful. The only thing that sounded good to eat was melted cheese dip and crunchy, salty tortilla chips. My mother in a

slightly embarrassed whisper explained that we didn't have enough money to buy the can of cheese dip even though we had the chips at home. She held up a can of ravioli hoping I could be persuaded to go with the cheaper option. I really, really wanted that cheese dip. I nodded my head noticing her sigh of relief. I know she felt ashamed she couldn't provide such a simple thing. She wanted to do something sweet for her sick child, but good intentions don't buy expensive cheese.

When we made it home, she pulled out the can opener so she could heat up the ravioli for us to share. I was playing in the floor and looked up when she suddenly got quiet. She stood still for what seemed like an eternity. "Come here," she called out, her voice breaking. "I can't explain this." I went into the kitchen anxious to see what had her so perplexed. She pushed the can over so I could

see inside. The label was clearly marked as plain red sauce covered pasta shapes. But the can in front of us was filled with golden, delicious cheese dip. I looked up at her in shock. I didn't know if she was laughing or crying; it was probably both. I swear this story is true. I never could explain the miracle that turned ravioli into cheese dip. It was one of many secrets my mother would carry to the afterlife with her. I'm sure a more scientific-minded person would look for the logical explanation. You know what? I'm okay not knowing. I'm okay believing that life works in mysterious ways. I'm okay believing that sometimes dusty old backroads lead to the pot of gold at the rainbow's end. I believe that magic can happen on ordinary days in ordinary ways to show little girls who don't have much that they are indeed quite extraordinary and worthy of miracles, too.

Film made in Tishomingo County premieres this weekend

Tishomingo County will see itself across the big screen September 9th when "Mysterious Circumstance: The Death of Meriwether Lewis" makes its local premiere at the Coliseum Theatre in Corinth, giving area residents -- many of whom worked on the film -- their first chance to see the award winning fruits of their labors.

Sorry, son, we have a new favorite corn recipe

Ever since he took up cooking, our son, Connor's assigned dish to make has been elotes, or Mexican Street Corn. His version just can't be beat, plus, it does a mama's heart good to watch him cooking in my kitchen - a rare sight these days now that he's building fancy cars in Los Angeles!

Correction: I thought it couldn't be beat.

Then, my dear husband made this to go along with some homemade carnitas (Mexican shredded pork) on Saturday of Labor Day weekend.

It was SO GOOD! I made him made an additional recipe of it Monday, so you could see it and I could share the recipe!

The recipe he used called for cutting the corn off the cob, but we did that back when we harvested it, and used our own frozen corn.

Enjoy!

Mexican Street Corn

6 medium-size ears of yellow corn on the cob
1 tablespoon vegetable oil or melted butter

¼ cup mayonnaise

¼ cup sour cream

½ teaspoon chile powder

1 tablespoon lime juice plus wedges of a lime for serving

½ cup crumbled cotija cheese (we used shredded Parmesan, since it's what we had)

3 tablespoons fresh cilantro chopped

To prep the corn: Cut the corn off the cob. I used 6 ears to get about 4 1/2 cups. Alternatively,

you can also use canned corn or frozen corn. If using frozen, you do not need to thaw it out.

Sauté corn: Heat oil in a skillet over medium-high heat. Stir in the corn, and stirring frequently, sauté for 5-7 minutes until it starts to char. If you are using frozen corn, you might need to cook a few minutes longer. Transfer to a bowl and set aside.

Make the sauce: Mix together mayonnaise, sour cream, chile powder, and lime juice in a bowl.

Assemble: Add in the mayo mixture into the sauteed corn. Give it a mix. Stir in the cotija cheese and sprinkle with cilantro. Serve in small bowls with wedges of lime on the side.

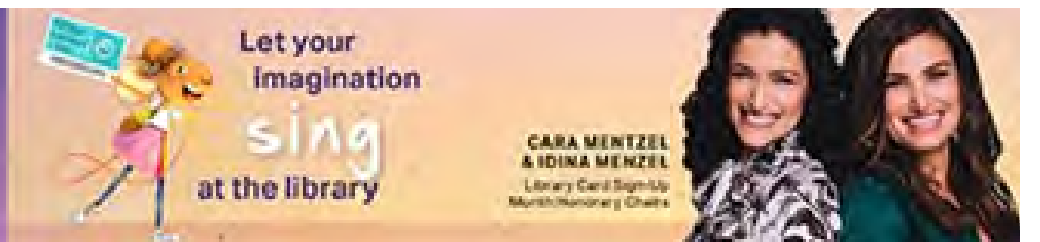
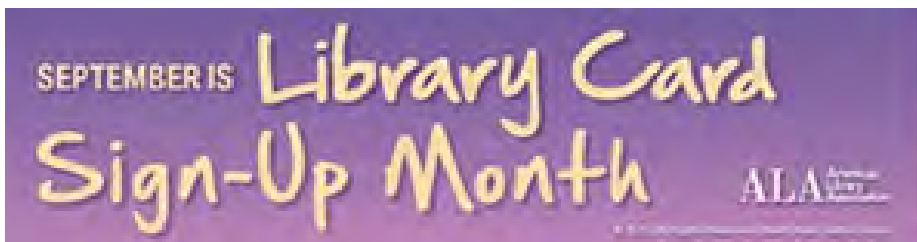

TAC Names Competition for Local Poet

The annual contest, formerly known as the TAC Fall Writing Competition, will become known as the Emory D. Jones Literary Competition.

"Dr. Jones has had a marked impact on so many young writers in our area throughout his years teaching in the English department at Northeast," says TAC Secretary Rachel Embrey. "He has always been an encourager. I can happen to meet him out somewhere, and he will reference a poem I wrote years ago as a student of his. That means so much."

For his part, Jones cites the opportunity he has had to influence young lives as the most rewarding aspect of his career as an English teacher.

The Ole Miss-educated Jones earned undergraduate degrees in history and English but went on to concentrate solely on English for his masters and doctorate. Afterwards, he taught in Alabama at Cherokee Vocational High

School, Northeast Alabama State Junior College, and Snead State Junior College before moving on to Northeast Mississippi Community College in Booneville, Mississippi. He retired from Northeast after teaching English there for thirty-six years. He lives in Iuka with his wife, Glenda, and they have two daughters and four grandchildren.

In addition to education, Jones has had another long-time love—poetry. "I wrote my first poem when I was ten years old," he says. "I echo what Carson McCullers said, 'I write stories for the same reason that I smoke cigarettes—not because it gives me pleasure, but because not to would cause pain.' I have over seven hundred poetical credits now because I am compelled to write poems."

Jones's work has been featured in numerous print and online publications including Deep South Maga-

zine, Delta Poetry Review, Modern Poetry Quarterly Review, Encore: Journal of the NFSPS, MockingHeart Review, American Poetry, Scarlet Leaf Review, and The Cumberland River Review.

No stranger to literary competitions, Jones says his proudest moments have come from his service to the Mississippi Poetry Society, having served numerous times as contest coordinator and twice as president, and to the National Federation of State Poetry Societies for which he served as competition coordinator in 2017.

LEVYING COUNTY AD VALOREM TAXES FOR TISHOMINGO COUNTY FOR THE CURRENT YEAR, 2022-2023 INCLUDING SCHOOL DISTRICT AND ANY OTHER TAXING DISTRICTS

There came on for hearing and determination by the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi on the 6th day of September, 2022 the matter of levying the ad valorem taxes for the fiscal year beginning October 1, 2022 for the County, for the road districts, for the Tishomingo County Special Municipal Separate School District, and for all other taxing districts and giving the tax rate, or levy, for the County and districts as stated in accordance with provisions of Section 27-39-317 of the Mississippi Code of 1972, Annotated, as amended, and other laws relative to said matter; and the Board having fully and carefully considered the needs and requirements of the various funds of the County and of said districts and rates or levies which are required to produce the revenue necessary to meet the budget as made fixed and hereto approved by this Board, as required by law; and it having been ascertained that the maintenance levies for the Tishomingo County Special Municipal Separate School District are supported by law; and it appearing that the tax rate or levies for the county and several county purposes, the road districts, the Tishomingo County Special Municipal Separate School District, and all other tax districts are necessary in order to raise the funds required to meet the expenses of the county, and the tax districts for said fiscal year.

IT IS, THEREFORE, ORDERED AND ADJUDGED by the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi that the following ad valorem tax rates or levies be and the same are hereby imposed and levied for the fiscal year 2022-2023 upon the assessed value of the taxable property in Tishomingo County, State of Mississippi, and respective road districts and School District and all other taxing districts in Tishomingo County as the property is now assessed and listed, or as may hereinafter be assessed and listed upon the assessment roll of said County as of January 1, 2022, (except property subject to the state tax only and except the exempted assessed value of homes to the extent exempted by the Homestead Exemption Act of 1947), the said rates expressed in mills or decimal fraction of mill, being levied or imposed upon each dollar of assessed valuation appearing on the assessment rolls of said county as aforesaid for the following funds or purposes; and when the same is collected, the money shall be credited to the respective funds as provided by law.

We come back to TC this week fully rested from a 3 day weekend! The teachers and students got an extra day to relax from all the chaos of school.



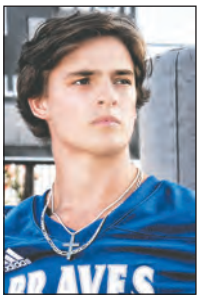

 (a) **Public service is a public trust** Each employee has a responsibility to the United States Government and its citizens **to place loyalty to the Constitution, laws and ethical principles above private gain**. To ensure that every citizen can have complete confidence in the integrity of the Federal Government, **each employee shall respect and adhere to the principles of ethical conduct set forth in this section**, as well as the implementing standards contained in this part and in supplemental agency regulations.

General principles. The following general principles apply to every employee and may form the basis for the standards contained in this part. Where a situation is not covered by the standards set forth in this part, employees shall apply the principles set forth in this section in determining whether their conduct is proper.

- 1) Public service is a public trust, requiring employees to place loyalty to the Constitution, the laws and ethical principles above private gain.
- 2) Employees shall not hold financial interests that conflict with the conscientious performance of duty.
- 3) Employees shall not engage in financial transactions using nonpublic Government information or allow the improper use of such information to further any private interest. [Insider Trading]
- 4) An employee shall not, except as permitted by subpart B of this part, solicit or accept any gift or other item of monetary value from any person or entity seeking official action from, doing business with, or conducting activities regulated by the employee's agency, or whose interests may be substantially affected by the performance or nonperformance of the employee's duties.
- 5) Employees shall put forth honest effort in the performance of their duties.
- 6) Employees shall not knowingly make unauthorized commitments or promises of any kind purporting to bind the Government.
- 7) Employees shall not use public office for private gain.
- 8) Employees shall act impartially and not give

preferential treatment to any private organization or individual

9) Employees shall protect and conserve Federal property and shall not use it for other than authorized activities.

10) Employees shall not engage in outside employment or activities, including seeking or negotiating for employment, that conflict with official Government duties and responsibilities.

11) Employees shall disclose waste, fraud, abuse, and corruption to appropriate authorities.

12) Employees shall satisfy in good faith their obligations as citizens, including all just financial obligations, especially those - such as Federal, State, or local taxes - that are imposed by law.

13) Employees shall adhere to all laws and regulations that provide equal opportunity for all Americans regardless of race, color, religion, sex, national origin, age, or handicap.

14) Employees shall endeavor to avoid any actions creating the appearance that they are violating the law or the ethical standards set forth in this part. Son of Burnsville gets Country Music Trail Marker

Local singer-songwriter Pete Pyle marker will be unveiled at Waterway Festival September 24th

Pete Pyle, a native of Burnsville who passed away on March 11, 1995, will be honored during the 30th Annual Waterway Festival with the unveiling of a Mississippi Country Music Marker.

The unveiling will take place at noon on September 24th. The marker will be located at 46 Gross Avenue at Highway 72 interchange next to Timbes Tire in Burnsville.

This will be a proud day for the Pyle family – giving Pete the notoriety he so much deserves after spending years in the country music business. His son, Jimmy Pyle, was a well-known musician in the Burnsville area, operating his own recording studio and performing in many local engagements. Jimmy's daughter, Regina, and Jimmy's youngest sister, Dwanna, have worked hard to bring this honor to Pete, who first performed locally with hometown friends, the Marlar Brothers, and later moved his family to Nashville to pursue his love for music.

Pete Pyle was a noted singer and songwriter who first became popular in the late 1930s and early 1940s. While just in his teens, he started out doing radio shows on WMSD Sheffield, Alabama, and locally on WCMA in Corinth. Pete traveled to Memphis and had radio shows on WMPS, WHBQ, and WMC.

In 1940, Pete signed his first record deal with RCA Victor and tried out for the Grand Ole Opry but was told that he was way too smooth. So, he went to Nashville competitors WSIX and WLAC and Pete's shows were sponsored by Sears and Roebuck.

Pete's recordings became so popular, as did his radio shows, that the Grand Ole Opry contacted Pete about becoming a member. However, in those days the Opry did not pay very much and Pete was making more money at the two competing stations. The Opry then offered Pete a show on their WSM station to help make up the difference and had him join the Opry.

One night at the Opry, Bill Monroe was missing a band member and asked Pete to stand in for the night. While Pete maintained his solo spot on the Opry and continued to record as a solo artist, in 1941 he became a member of Bill Monroe's Bluegrass Boys. Pete has been credited with helping Bill create his signature High Lonesome sound.

Pete also wrote many of Bill's songs including "Highway of Sorrow," "True Life Blues," "Happy on my Way," and "Don't Put Off Till Tomorrow What You Can Do Today." Pete is also credited with helping Bill start his Bean Blossom Festival which still is an annual event today.

February 1942, Pete was drafted into the Army during World War Two. He was honored to serve in Washington DC guarding the president.

After returning from the war, Pete went out on the road with Earnest Tubbs for the summer.

Harold Bradley was one of the band members and said Pete went on first because in those days the most popular person performed first and Earnest insisted Pete performed since his songs were very popular at the time. Pete then joined Grand Ole Opry member Pee Wee King and the Golden West Cowboys and traveled with them for about a year.

In 1944 Pete returned to the Grand Ole Opry with his new band the Mississippi Valley Boys. He hosted a daily radio show on WSM. Pete was the first Grand Ole Opry member to name his band after the state of Mississippi and was always proud to be from Burnsville.

Pete also toured with artists such as Grandpa Jones, Cousin Wilbur, Minnie Pearl, Roy Acuff, Uncle Dave Macon, and Little Jimmy Dickens

Pete's song, Lovin' Lies, was recorded by Little Jimmy Dickens in 1950. It was later recorded by George Jones, Willie Nelson, Don Gibson, and Porter Wagner.

Pete had a lot of songs recorded over the years. He was noted for his songwriting. Many of his songs don't even have his name listed on them. As it was common in those days, he would write a song and give it to someone or even sometimes sell them.

Due to health issues, Pete quit performing so much on the road and focused on his songwriting at his home in Nashville. But after the death of his wife in 1976, Pete was left to raise the last of his 10 children, Dwanna. At the urging of his teenage daughter, they began to go out and travel and sing gospel and country songs together in Tennessee, Alabama, Mississippi and Arkansas. He also began to record again with his daughter Dwanna.

Pete would often visit and perform on his friends' TV show... The Buddy and Kay Bain Morning Show on WTVA. Pete and Dwanna would even travel and do local shows with Buddy and Kay.

In the 1980s Cattle Records re-released some of Pete's 78's in Germany and now they are selling all over the world.

Pete Pyle was the son of James E. Pyle and Sudie Ann Whitaker of Burnsville. Their homeplace was past where Harmony Hill and Hilltop Apartments now are located. The farm was once owned by the Honeycutt family before it was bought by the Pyle family. The Pyle family gave some of their land for Possum Trot Cemetery. They owned all the land from the cemetery

down to the railroad tracks. Some of the land was given away over the years and some of the land was sold to Avon Tucker and later sold to a Mr. Hammon from Corinth.

Pete Pyle's grandparents were Johnson P. Pyle and Mary Ellen Killingsworth; and Reverend William Whitaker and Sarah Skinner. Pete married Naomi Coulter from Kentucky. She was living in Nashville when Pete met her. Pete and Naomi had 10 children: 6 boys and 4 girls, oldest to youngest – Haroldene (Denie); Jimmy; Johnny; Linda; Jackie; Tommy; Paul Glen; Ricky; Sherry; and Dwanna.
